We are returning to popular Seneca Creek State Park near Gaithersburg for our picnic this year. The date is Sunday, September 24, from 1-5 PM.

We will be at the Fawn Pavilion, the large covered picnic facility we have used for many years. It is located on the south side of Clopper Lake. Follow the signs, or ask for directions at the gate. The park does charge a nominal entry fee per person that they will collect at the gate.

The chapter will provide hamburgers, hotdogs, and buns. We are looking for someone who will bring the drinks this time. If you can assist with that, please let Ginny Mohr know. For the rest of us, please bring some other picnic type food like salads, sides, or desserts to share with others.

Alcoholic beverages are not allowed. There are no trash cans so we must remove our own trash.

Plant Exchange: A popular part of our annual picnic is a plant exchange. To participate, just bring a plant worth about \$5 to trade with others. Our Banquet Speaker: Steve Henning "Rhododendrons and Gardens of Scotland"

Steve and his wife Darlene bought their present home in Pennsylvania in 1965 and, thus, began their interest in gardening. They went to the 1972 Philadelphia Flower Show in search of the American Rhododendron Society. They were in luck and found an exhibit by the Greater Philadelphia Chapter of the ARS who informed them about the Valley Forge Chapter. They have been members of the VF chapter ever since.

Steve started Henning's Rhododendron & Azalea Pages in 1996, trying to provide in one place, a reference of things that many rhododendron experts take for granted or may have forgotten, but that new members of the ARS and new "rhodoholics" will learn over time. http://rhodyman.net/rhodyn.php

On November 9, 2010, the National Arboretum announced it would "be deaccessioning our National Boxwood Collection and the Perennial Collections as well as the Glenn Dale Hillside portion of the Azalea Collection." Steve discussed this with long-time National Arboretum supporter Don Hyatt. Don and Steve decided that Don would lead a personal education campaign on various media and in talks at garden clubs, while Steve created the website: SaveTheAzaleas.org.

The campaign went viral. On April 25, 2012, the National Arboretum announced a reversal in its plans and declared the Glenn Dale Azaleas a heritage collection which should be preserved. FONA, Friends of the National Arboretum, raised over 1 million dollars to insure continuing care of the azalea, boxwood and perennial collections. Thank you Steve!

In 2013, Steve volunteered to create ARSStore.org. This store is alive and well, and has raised over \$2,500 for the ARS through referral fees from online purchases from Amazon. Please go to the ARS Store first before linking to Amazon so the ARS will get a commission.

Steve was a physicist for Bell Labs for 27 years and then a Boy Scout executive for 13 years. Now retired, his activities include Scouting, gardening, traveling, photography and being a Rotarian. He enjoys giving presentations on rhododendrons and azaleas.

Thoughts on Scotland

Scotland is known for its magnificent castles and beautiful gardens. What may seem strange is that it is basically at the same latitude as Labrador in Canada where winters are severe and the ocean will freeze solid. Scotland has a very benign climate since the warm Atlantic currents like the Gulf Stream help moderate temperatures and provide moisture.



Being so far north, these Benmore Castle gardens never get too hot in the summer, either. It is an ideal place to grow rhododendrons and they do grow them to perfection! Our native azaleas were not as happy since they do appreciate hot summers.

Many gardens on the southwest coast are actually subtropical in nature and they can grow very tender plants including palms and tender rhododendrons like the fragrant Maddenias outside without protection. They can grow the large leaf species like *R. sinogrande* which can have leaves up to 3 ft. in

length and large flower trusses of light yellow. It is native to the foothills of the Himalayas and Yunnan in western China. We can't grow those plants in our area.

The Edinburgh Botanic Garden is considered by many to be the best rock garden in the world. They can grow all the dwarf alpine rhododendrons and rare companion plants. Alpine rhododendrons die in hot summers but are very happy in Scotland. They also have an enormous collection of rhododendron species so it is little wonder that they have long been the center for rhododendron taxonomists.

Peter and Euan Cox founded Glendoick Gardens in Perth Scotland in 1953. It has been one of the major retail sources for rhododendrons in Europe. It is now run by 3rd generation Kenneth Cox but they no longer sell mail order. The Cox family has been noted for their many plant explorations to China and the Himalayas to collect new rhododendron species that they can introduce to the world. They are prolific authors and have written at least 20 excellent books about rhododendrons which are available on Some of Ken's new rhododendron the Internet. hybrids are available in the US now, thanks to tissue culture. 'Wine and Roses' has pink and red flowers with dark leaves. 'Ever Red' has red flowers with leaves that are dark reddish brown to almost black.

Garden Tour Remembrances

Were you able to join us on the chapter garden tours on May 6th this year? Spring was early and the weather forecast was for rain that day, but Mother Nature smiled on us and we had a wonderful time.

Our first stop was the home of Tim and Catherine Wallenmeyer in Gaithersburg, MD. They have a lovely wooded lot with broad expanses of lawn bordered by curving beds filled with rhododendrons, azaleas, and companion plants, many of which they bought at past chapter auctions. A large 'Percy Wiseman' in the front yard was past peak but many of us were enthralled by it anyway. That rhododendron is very difficult for us to grow and most of us can only keep it alive a year or two. They obviously are master horticulturists!

Most people in our society are just as interested in the companion plants as we are with the rhododendrons and azaleas. The Wallenmeyers had a white variety of sweetshrub (Calycanthus) called 'Venus' that was just beginning to open. Most forms of sweetshrub have dark red flowers so this plant with its fragrant waterlilylike blossoms raised much attention.

Some of us stopped by the Brighton Dam Azalea Garden which must have been pretty but way past peak. We met for lunch at a picnic pavilion and then headed to the garden of Bob and Rosa McWhorter.

The McWhorter's large wooded garden is always spectacular and they have so many exciting things to see. They have many winding paths in the garden with mature rhododendrons and rare companion plants along the trails. Those treasures add interest to the landscape.

Some of the McWhorter's companion plants that impressed me included a variegated hosta that had white and green leaves but with red stems. It is called 'Raspberry Sundae' and really did stand out in the garden. A burgundy and white lady's slipper orchid

(Cyrpipedium) was one of the new hybrids and very elegant. The McWhorters had planted an Asian Mayapple (Podophyllum) called 'Spotty Dottie' on the bank beside the driveway. Many of us got one of those during this spring's field trip to Pennsylvania nurseries. The Asian Podophyllums have large umbrella-like leaves with distinctive markings. The plants have been very expensive, often running \$40 and up for small plants in just a 4-inch pot. One nursery had large plants in gallon pots for \$18, so we couldn't pass it up!

Bob and Rosa have been adding new hybrids from local hybridizers. One plant we had to see was Tom Ahern's 'Amazing Grace'. The flowers are a blend of pink and orange and they seem to glow, even on a cloudy day. Their plant was in fine form.

Bob had several new rhododendron hybrids that he had raised from seed that were blooming for the first time. It is always exciting to see first blooms since you have no idea what the flowers will look like. A cross of 'Disca' x 'Dexter's Honeydew' raised from our chapter seed exchange had large fragrant trusses of ivory white and blush pink. Bob's cross of 'Vineland' with pollen of the species *R. ririei* he got from the Rhododendron Species Foundation had soft pink flowers. Consider raising some plants from seed this year. It is great fun!

Most gardens have a peak season, but even though we may have been a bit late this year, the gardens were lovely and we had a chance to admire plants that we typically do not see on tours or in the flower show.

Our final garden visit was to Carol Segree's place. Carol has been remodeling her home, adding an addition in back that replaced her deck with a huge kitchen and breakfast area. She can now overlook her garden year round through the large windows. Her contractors have put in new walkways and a patio, too.

Professionally, Carol has been a graphics designer so you can see her artistic choice of colors and design skills everywhere in the garden. She carefully positions unusual trees and shrubs in the landscape and uses annuals and companion plants as bold accents. One of my favorite accents was a large, rustic frog planter (below left) in which she planted a new orange-leafed oxalis called 'Molten Lava' with the yellow Creeping Jenny 'Goldilocks'. It was the perfect combination!

'Dream of Kings' on a Trail

Carol has made excellent use of the typography in her garden. The central is nearly flat where she has an open grassy area garden room. There are ravines on at the perimeter and winding paths in the woods. Pictured above right is a large purple rhododendron 'Dream of Kings' with 'Hachmann's Charmant' just beyond.

Some trees in the backyard and on the side have been taken down and others have been trimmed high to provide light. Carol's front yard has significant sun and is an excellent place for many perennials including peonies and iris and many deciduous azaleas.

Along the walk beside the house, I was impressed with how a clump of yellow peonies was echoed by the color of the deciduous azalea 'Golden Lights' in the distance. Her peony is one of the Itoh hybrids which are crosses between herbaceous and tree peonies. They come in many new colors and have strong stems that do not need staking. 'Bartzella' is my favorite!
